We should expect the unexpected from a God who surprised the disciples by rising Christ from the dead......

May God, who sent his Son to reconcile the world, surprise you afresh as you once more consider the cost, the glory and the joy. Be surprised this Easter!



Joyce Cross

Part of the eulogy from Joyce Cross' funeral, led by Rev Diane Smith at Seven Hills Crematorium on 28th February.

ELEANOR JOYCE CROSS was born on the 28th June 1919 in Grantchester in the county of Cambridgeshire to Leonard and Florence Spiller. She was known by the family as Joyce. A year later her brother Vernon was born. They grew up and went to school in Grantchester. As a teenager Joyce went to Cambridge High school but moved with her family to Felixstowe when she was about sixteen. Her father had gained employment with the Felixstowe Times newspaper as a reporter. When things were busy, Joyce was asked to help out following up stories and this was how she eventually met her husband – she had been sent to the Crosses house in Margaret Street to take details about the funeral of old Mr Cross. On leaving the house she told her father that she didn't want anything to do with those Crosses, they were an odd lot! The family still have a copy of the newspaper report that Joyce wrote about the funeral.

Obviously Joyce changed her mind about those Crosses when she met Leslie Cross, who was a merchant seaman and had just returned from Australia so that he could join the Metropolitan Police. This was 1937. After a three year courtship Joyce and Les (as he was known) were married at Grantchester Church on 12th November 1940.

As the war had broken out by then it was decided that it was too dangerous for Joyce to go to London with Les, who was staying in the section house in Peckham, so she returned to Felixstowe to live with her parents in Chepstow Road. She worked in the Dr Barnardo's Home on High Road East, looking after the young children.

In June 1942 her first son Leonard was born, followed by Michael in Sept 1943. Her husband was called up in 1942 and was a Bombardier in the Royal Artillery.

After the war in 1946 the family moved to Brockley, South London where Valerie was born. Les was still stationed at Peckham Police Station and the family moved again, this time to Bing House, Brixton Hill, which was a block of 60 Police flats. The Crosses home was on the top floor- 5 stories up. This was where Tony was born in 1948 and Lesley their daughter in 1957. Poor Joyce had to drag the pram up and down ten flights of stairs every time she went out. The flat had an open fire and Joyce had to fill the coal bucket from the coal shed down the hall. (Luckily the coalman carried the coal up the ten flights of stairs). Life was not easy. The family stayed at Bing House for about ten years and then moved to the old Police station in New Barnet where the children's bedrooms were in the old cell block.

After about 18 months the family were on the move again, this time to Ponders End where John was born. When John was about 2 years old the family bought a house on High Road West in Felixstowe in readiness for Les's retirement. Joyce, John and daughter Lesley moved here whilst Mick and his father stayed in Ponders End until Les could move down to be with the family.

In 1979 Joyce became very poorly and it was discovered that she had a brain tumour. She was very fortunate to have been referred to Maida Vale Hospital where her tumour was removed and she made a full recovery. Around this time she could often be seen walking her goat, Daisy, on a lead with her two dogs along the grass verges. This caught the eye of a reporter and a lovely article appeared in the local paper.

In late 1979 Joyce had the opportunity to visit her son Leonard, in Australia; he had emigrated, aged 21 with his wife and Joyce had not seen him for 18 years. At the same time she arranged to meet up with her brother Vernon who was also living in Australia. It must have been a very emotional time for Joyce but as with everything she took it all in her stride.

In 1987, in the week of the great storm, Les and Joyce moved one last time to Hawkes Lane – you will be pleased to hear that there wasn't yet another new baby with this move! They enjoyed life watching their family expand and with ten grandchildren and thirteen great grandchildren there was always someone popping in for a visit.

Joyce worshiped at Seaton Road Methodist Church and enjoyed being a member of the Ladies Evening Fellowship. She participated in many Church activities and was always happy to help with fund raising projects. She was also a member of the Co-op Guild and for many years hosted a lovely Christmas party for the ladies. She particularly liked to spend time making lovely sweets and tasty titbits for the evening and getting some of her grandchildren to do little 'turns' to entertain the group.

Joyce always loved creative cookery but was happy to let her husband do the day to day meals as he enjoyed cooking as well. When Les died in 1999, with the help of her family, she adjusted to her new life style well, enjoying the flowers and birds in her garden.

In later years as she became more frail she was happy to have most of her family close by and was very grateful for all the help that Lesley and Valerie gave her on a day to day basis.

When things became too much for the family alone to cope with her, daughter Lesley, who had become her main carer, was forced to get extra help for Joyce. The whole family would like to thank the lovely group of people who became Joyce's carers, visiting every day and seeing to her needs with such loving care and compassion. Without their help the family would not have been able to have kept Joyce in her own home where she really wanted to remain.

Joyce was a lovely Mum, Mum in Law, Nannie and Great Nannie. She loved and was proud of her whole family.

She will be really missed in so many ways.

Holy Week - "Why The Killing Of Jesus Really Matters"
