"Cops and Robbers" is the theme of the two Holiday Clubs being run this summer both at Seaton Road and Trinity. The material looks at the life of Joseph, Jacobs's favourite son, and all the problems and headache this particular family endure. Joseph's brothers sell him into slavery but many years later seek out his forgiveness. It is a story of high emotion and complete change of heart, a story of reconciliation forgiveness and redemption. What a fantastic message for people of all ages.

This same Joseph is of course the subject of the much loved musical hit "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat."

The Felixstowe Carnival this year has adopted the theme of shows and musicals and in the Mission Area Dawn Bone, our lay worker, has been working with all different groups of people to prepare "Our Joseph float".

On the day leaflets and sweets will be given out to the crowd advertising Worship and other events in the Mission Area. It is not too late to get involved in any of the above or the Fun Day to be held at Kirton Methodist Church on the August 3rd 10am to 12 midday. Please do have a chat with either myself or Dawn.

AND IT WORKS:


I ALREADY HAVE 3 PEOPLE FOLLOWING ME : 2 POLICE OFFICERS AND A PSYCHIATRIST.

Short Reflection on Joseph -

The story of Joseph, recorded in the book of Genesis, has been a favourite of many down through the years. It is a complex story of favouritism, jealously, failed seduction and betrayal. In other words it has all the recognised ingredients of a soap opera.

A close study of the story will reveal that Joseph's trust in God matures and develops as he himself grows older and wiser. As a boy he is presented as one who has rather an inflated ego who fails to understand how the pronounced favouritism of his father impacts his brothers.

When his brothers sell him into slavery they tell their father Jacob that he has been killed. By this action they cause untold pain and hardship. However, later in life, after Joseph has endured much in prison he is set free and eventually becomes Pharaoh's right hand man.

Jacob and his other sons, and their families, are now close to starvation. The sons come to Egypt in search of the equivalent of a present day food bank.

Joseph recognises them, but they do not recognise Joseph at first. Joseph does forgive his brothers but not before some quite devious behaviour on his part.

The story ends very dramatically with Jacob being reunited with his long lost son.

All sorts of links are made in this story with other parts of Scripture. Some link the Joseph of the Old Testament with the Joseph of the New as they both have their lives changed by dreams. Some say "Joseph" is a characterisation of the relationship between God and the Hebrews with all its joys and sorrows.

The Musical Joseph and his Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat and the DVD, staring none other than Donny Osmond, help to make this story come alive in a most engaging and enjoyable way.

The story of Joseph appeals to all ages but is certainly not just a piece of light weight entertainment; it continues to challenge us all with moral and ethical dilemmas.

The material for this year's Holiday Clubs "Cops and Robbers" will look at much of the story of Joseph and help the young people to have a deeper understanding of this important Biblical Character.

News from Seaton Road.....

1. Community BBQ 5th September 12noon – 2pm

The East Anglia District has invited all churches to "Radical Hospitality":

"We encourage each church to engage in a local event for your community to show that your church is an active presence within that context. There should be no expectation that this will grow your Sunday morning service. Just lashings of generosity as God abundantly drenches us with His love."

With this aim in mind Seaton Road will host a Community BBQ offering sausages & bacon rolls in the car park between church & hall. Neighbouring streets will be leafleted and also the organisations that use the church premises & families that take part in our church activities. There will be tables & chairs outside, the playground will be in use and Rev. Diane will offer adult & child activities in the church. Dawn (lay worker) ad Lorna (PN) will be on hand to talk to visitors. Why not come along to help us cook or meet & greet!

2. Harvest Festival 27th September

This year there will be a traditional all-age Harvest Festival led by Rev. Diane. This will give us the opportunity to sing traditional harvest hymns so loved by many but only sung once a year. Our charity will be BASIC & we ask you to bring items to the service to donate to the food bank at the BASIC life charity shop in Walton. Flowers (but not produce) can also be brought to the service to bring the church to life on this harvest day. (The previous Sunday is Café

Worship where we plan to have a harvest theme & decorate the windows ready for the Harvest Festival.)

3. BASIC DIP (donations into parcels) Box

At the recent AGM it was decided we would keep a BASIC DIP box in the church to allow the congregation to regularly donate provisions to the local food bank. It was felt our support for BASIC should be ongoing & not just for Harvest.

Items welcomed in the box are:-

Tinned goods: Soup, meat, fish, beans, pasta shapes, fruit, custard, rice pudding and vegetables

Dried goods: Instant mashed potatoes, pasta, soup and pasta in sauce packets,

Sterilised or UHT milk Teabags and instant coffee UHT

cheese triangles

Peanut butter and jam Biscuits, cakes, crackers and crisps

Baby rusks, baby food Breakfast cereals

Toiletries: Shampoo, deodorant, nappies, babywipes, baby lotion, razors, shaving foam.

Small and large sizes All goods intact in package, in date

It was a day to remember for Eric Cook (Seaton Road) after he was invited to attend a Garden Party at Buckingham Palace.

The occasion was to mark the 100th anniversary of UK Blind Veterans, an organisation that Eric belongs to and one which has helped him tremendously over the past few years including short breaks at their centre in Ovingdean, near Brighton.



And he even had a pass into the Diplomatic Tent, right near the Royal guest who was Sophie, Countess of Wessex, the wife of Prince Edward, who looked stunning in a pale blue dress. Eric was able to catch a glimpse of her as she spent over an hour talking to veterans and guests before making her way to the Royal Tent to meet and greet some of the other dignitaries.

Eric was able to take a guest and his son Russell accompanied him on the trip as they went by car to London parking up in a reserved place in The Mall. "The traffic coming in and out of the capital was awful, it was so busy, but it was a wonderful day and we both thoroughly enjoyed it," he said. "It really was a once in a lifetime moment for us both and something I will always treasure."

Eric and Russell set off from Felixstowe just after 11am and arrived in good time for the party which started at 3pm and was attended by an estimated 2,000 people from all over the country. They made their way to Buckingham Palace after parking the car and joined the long line of guests who snaked round by the railings of the Royal residence all dressed up in their posh frocks and smart suits for the event.

Sandwiches, cakes, tea, coffee and soft drinks were the order of the day with glorious weather giving it that added special ingredient. Eric lapped up the atmosphere. "I was just happy just to sit there and soak up the occasion and I felt really privileged to have been invited along. UK Blind Veterans have done so much to help me and it was great that Russell was able to come along with me."

The party ended at 6pm and it was time to face the capital's traffic again and Eric arrived home just before 10pm

A NEW VENTURE IN THE MISSION AREA - 'OPEN THE BOOK'

On Sat 16th May, those who had expressed an interest in being part of a newly formed Open the Book team met at Seaton Road. We were introduced to the programme by Di Barker, the Open the Book leader in the Bury St Edmunds



and Ipswich Diocese, and discovered that it was a national registered charity, now backed by the Bible Society, which was started in 1999 in Bedford, and welcomed into countless schools across the United Kingdom.

Open the Book offers a programme of themed and dramatised Bible stories, each around 10 minutes long, that fit into Collective Worship/Assembly time in schools. Teams of volunteer storytellers, go in to schools to present scripted and directed stories, using props and costumes in an engaging, lively and fun way.

Jane Reed, Headteacher of Fairfield and Colneis Schools has expressed interest in welcoming a regular Open the Book team to lead assemblies, so from the start of the Autumn term, there will be an Open the Book team visiting both schools every three weeks.
