Joshua 24: 15 "Choose yourself today whom you will serve. As for me, I will serve the Lord"





#### Walton Parish Nursing, Felixstowe

Seaton Road Methodist Church & Maidstone Road Baptist Church are in the first stages of coming together into a new ecumenical partnership of Parish Nursing to serve the community of Walton.

Funding has been secured from The Methodist Church to support this project for 3 years. Our vision is to employ two part-time Parish Nurses to continue the work already established by MRBC, which has specialised in care of the elderly, but also to develop new areas of work where need has been identified in Walton, namely work with young people and families.



A job advert for a new Parish Nurse is currently being circulated.

A new constitution is being drawn up to embrace the new ecumenical project. Charitable status is being sought via a CIO, Charitable Incorporated Organisation, which will be up and running once the new legislation has gone through parliament.

For this new project to work both churches will need people from their congregations to help with the running of it; people who have a passion for Parish Nursing and a belief that God is calling us to this ministry, that of being Christians outside our church walls.

The project will be run by a set of trustees and a management team drawn from both churches.

## As a church we are asked to prayerfully consider the roles and recognise the gifts needed.

The following are abbreviated descriptions of each role.

#### The Trustees

- The trustees will work to the CIO constitution.
- The trustees shall be accountable to the churches.
- The trustees shall oversee the appointment of the Parish Nurse.
- The trustees shall ensure compliance with all legal requirements.
- The trustees shall have the power to amend the way of working.

#### The Management Team shall be responsible for:

- Appointing the Parish Nurse(s).
- Monitoring the work of the Parish Nurse(s) and volunteers, to ensure that the objects of Walton Parish Nursing, Felixstowe are met.
- Overseeing the raising of funds and publicising its work.
- Providing news and information about the work of Walton Parish Nursing, Felixstowe for the participating churches.
- Championing Parish Nursing in the church and the community
- Deciding and agreeing how the ministry serves the churches and community.

#### Chairperson

- To plan management team meetings with the Secretary.
- To keep order at meetings and ensure everyone has a say.
- To ensure meetings are time limited and stick to the point.
- To ensure that decisions are arrived at in a fair and orderly way
- To summarise decisions made at the end of each agenda item.
- To act as a spokesperson for the group, when required.

#### Treasurer

- To administer the financial affairs of the group.
- To keep accounts of all financial transactions.

#### Secretary

- To take minutes and follow up decisions taken.
- To answer general enquiries and take appropriate action
- To maintain a supply of the group's publications and publicity material.
- To ensure good communications between members .

#### Line Manager

Oversees the day to day running of Parish Nursing

#### Spiritual mentor

- Provides spiritual support for the Parish Nurse.
- Prays regularly for the Parish Nurse, especially on the

days when they are on duty, but also on other days, for their health, strength, well-being and walk with the Lord, their family life and their relationships

#### Professional mentor

- Supports, mentors and provides advice to the Parish Nurse.
- Gives advice on the professional nursing aspects of Parish Nursing.
- Ensures that the Parish Nurse adheres to rules laid down by the Nursing Midwifery council and work to local and national nursing guidelines.

#### Other possible roles

Volunteer representative Fundraiser

There were quizzes, a sing-song, delicious fish and chips for lunch and much conversation between helpers and visitors and reminiscences of the old days.

It was an opportunity for Paul Taylor, as manager of Hope Trust, to engage with visitors, offer assistance from Hope Trust and remind them of the open coffee morning every Wednesday and the monthly activities afternoon on Mondays for those feeling lonely or needing company of others.

#### Harvest

This year our harvest celebrations will take place on Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> September with a café worship service.

The Church Council has chosen Tools With A Mission (TWAM) as our harvest charity. As well as monetary donations we will be making a tool collection and also hoping to make up a few scholar packs. Please see the noticeboard at the back of the church for details of acceptable items.



As in previous years, to make the church look 'harvesty' we will be decorating the church with fruit and flowers on Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> from 10am. The flowers will be distributed to the sick and elderly but we ask that other items are taken back, by those who brought the em, after the service. Various church organisations will be asked to decorate some of the window sills but it would be good to be able to decorate the vestibule too, so everybody is invited to join in the decoration and provision of flowers etc. as we celebrate and give thanks to God for he all has provided for us. A few facts about TWAM which started over 25 years ago:

- It enables people in Africa to earn a living and to support themselves.
- It collects and refurbishes tools and equipment no longer required in the UK and sends them overseas.
- In 2010 over 434 separate projects benefited from 220 tonnes of aid, (worth over £1m), shipped from

TWAM's warehouse in Ipswich and sent to Zambia, Uganda, Rwanda, Kenya, South Africa, Tanzania and Sierra Leone.

- Each container of goods costs £3000 to send
- Many of the tools and equipment are sent to schools, colleges and training establishments to help children and young people learn a useful trade.

Please support our harvest in order to help TWAM 'Tackling Poverty with Practical Skills'.

#### **Church Family Weekend**

On 15<sup>th</sup> July twenty five adults and nine children from Seaton Road wended our way to Belsey Bridge Conference centre Ditchingham for our Church Family Weekend away. Although the same place we always go to, the Centre has been taken over since our last visit and now has a new name. Apart from one or two improvements it was very much the same place that we all know and love. Unfortunately the English summer weather wasn't very summery but, apart from this meaning the use of the outdoor swimming pool was not a possibility, this didn't effect our enjoyment. The theme of the weekend was 'Roots and Routes' and on the Friday evening after dinner we explored this with a fun evening of a music quiz, making magic maize pictures and a turtle travelling race. The evening ended with a short worship session.

On Saturday morning we had two sessions. In the first one we solved clues to help us travel around the country and find out more about the roots of some of our church family. Following coffee we again had to solve clues but this time using the Bible to get our directions and completing forfeits if we took a wrong turn. One of the forfeits involved building a bridge from cardboard and it was a joy to see how the seven youngest children could have so much fun from a small amount of cardboard – I'm sure there is a sermon there somewhere!

The outdoor activities often undertaken during the free time of the Saturday afternoon were curtailed by the very wet weather but everyone still managed to keep themselves occupied – some went swimming in the indoor pool at Bungay, some watched videos of previous church family weekends and saw how we'd aged over 20+ years (not

always a pretty sight!!!!), some did the jigsaw which is always a part of the weekend, some read and some slept! In the evening after a short concert, which included a visit from Beryl and Gladys (aka David and Elizabeth) Malcolm led us around Felixstowe with a pictorial quiz. After prayers and coffee the 'stay up late people' had great fun with an impromptu game of 'Pringoal' (using a small empty Pringle container) and tiddlewinks – just shows we are all still children at heart!!!

The first session of Sunday morning, in the form of a prayer walk around the beautiful grounds at Ditchingham, was led by David. Singing to flute and guitar we had a hymn, prayer and reading at each of the five stops. The children did a bit of tree climbing and bubble blowing on the way! Everyone agreed this, as always, was a very special time praising God in the open air among the trees and overlooking the fields. The rest of the morning was spent reflectively through spiritual creativity or crafts.

The final session was spent in worship, bringing all parts of the weekend together through song, word, prayer and dance.

All too soon the weekend came to and end. It was time to gather our belongings (it's incredible the amount of things we take and how they 'spread' over the two days!), pack up and say our goodbyes.

We give our thanks to God for another weekend full of fun and fellowship – a time to share conversation, thoughts, activities and meals as a church family of all ages from 2 to 92.

#### A taste of Uganda

What a wonderful evening we had on Saturday July 23<sup>rd</sup> when the Mission Area gathered at Seaton Road to welcome Catriona home from her year in Uganda and hear all about her experiences. Firstly, the Bentley family had prepared some simple Ugandan food for us to sample. By the time we had had a spoonful of everything our plates were quite full and some of the dishes which looked 'different' actually tasted good. After feasting on stews, rice, sweet potatoes, plantain, a peanut recipe plus some other dishes, we finished our meal with more familiar banana, pineapple and mango, all fruits very common in Uganda.

Leaving all the dirty dishes we moved into the church to listen to Catriona's experiences of life, work, leisure and worship in Uganda as she showed us pictures of the many people and places we had heard about in the emails she had regularly sent home during the year. Catriona is an anaesthetist and her skills saw her assisting and performing operations for cleft palette and hair lip, removal of tumours

and caesarean sections to name a few. We were touched by many of the pictures, particularly those of the small children having surgery and the new born babies all lined up on a trolley to go to the nursery. Ugandan operating theatres are sparsely equipped so Catriona quickly learnt to adapt to using what equipment there was. She was also able to offer some of her expertise by training others to continue the work when she returned to England.

Catriona also told us about general life in Uganda – climate, food, transport, shopping etc and it did show us that we should never complain about the state of British roads again!! During the year Catriona worshipped at several different churches but the main one was one whose services could last up to 5 hours long! Apparently, people come and go during the service but most people stay for the entirety. Again perhaps we should give this some thought when our services go five minutes over the hour!!

Looking at the keepsakes Catriona had collected, or been given as leaving presents, and watching the slides many of us could appreciate a small part of how the Ugandan people live and why Catriona has been so touched by them and the country and would be happy to return if she has the opportunity.

We thank Catriona for sharing her Ugandan experience with us and making the people and country more 'real' to us. She has now returned to Birmingham to complete her consultancy training over the next eighteen months. We wish her well and pray that she will not find it too hard to settle into Western living again.

#### Holiday Club Starship Discovery 5-4-3-2-1 we have lift off!

lift off! We had over 30 children pre-booked and numbers each day ranged between 31 and 42 so a good number for our hall. We worked in six groups; the Roaring Rockets, Amazing Aliens, Mighty Meteorites, Spinning Planets, Space Walkers and Flying Saucers.

Each morning was planned down to the last minute, although we did sometimes find ourselves playing catch up to get everything finished before the children were collected at 12.30pm. We had singing, team challenges, memory verses, Grandma Watts cosmic bop (aerobics), stories, games, drama, puppets, quizzes, crafts and refreshments. Listed like that I'm surprised we managed to get it all in each morning!!

The children were fantastic. They quickly learned the words and actions to songs, bops and memory verses, enthusiastically joined in with the games and listened quietly to the bible story, drama and Ratty and Stinky, our puppet friends.

The whole week was based on the bible stories of Peter – turning, trusting, tripping, transforming and training. The Watts family portrayed an equivalent modern day scenario in each day's drama as they were transported into outer space complete with a transporter, flashing light and smoke!

On the Friday morning parents, families and friends were invited to see what the children had been up to all week. It was good to have a large number supporting this and they cheered enthusiastically as each group of children marched around the hall showing the various crafts they had made during the week which included teeshirts, rockets (thank you to all those who supplied empty kitchen roll holders) air dry clay models of an alien on a flying saucer or shooting star, and edible aliens. Following the march round our guests were treated to the bop, singing and drama.

Holiday club extra was held on the Sunday morning when we shared with the church family some of the week's events. It was encouraging to have 15 of the youngsters and their parents joining us too, as well as some of the helpers.

The whole week was great fun, very tiring but a good form of outreach to children and families in our area, giving us the opportunity to share God's love for us all.

A week like this does not just happen and we say a very big thank you to David and Elizabeth, Moe from Walton Parish Church and friends from Trinity and Trimley Methodist churches, as well as everyone from Seaton Road, who helped us in any way to make our 'Starship Discovery' week such a success.
